YouGov interviewed 821 respondents who were then matched down to a sample of 700 to produce the final dataset. The respondents were matched to a sampling frame on gender, age, race, and education. The frame was constructed by stratified sampling from the full 2019 American Community Survey (ACS) 1-year sample with selection within strata by weighted sampling with replacements (using the person weights on the public use file).

The matched cases were weighted to the sampling frame using propensity scores. The matched cases and the frame were combined and a logistic regression was estimated for inclusion in the frame. The propensity score function included age, gender, race/ethnicity, years of education, and region. The propensity scores were grouped into deciles of the estimated propensity score in the frame and post-stratified according to these deciles.

The weights were then post-stratified on 2016 and 2020 Presidential vote choice, and a four-way stratification of gender, age (4-categories), race (4-categories), and education (4-categories), to produce the final weight.

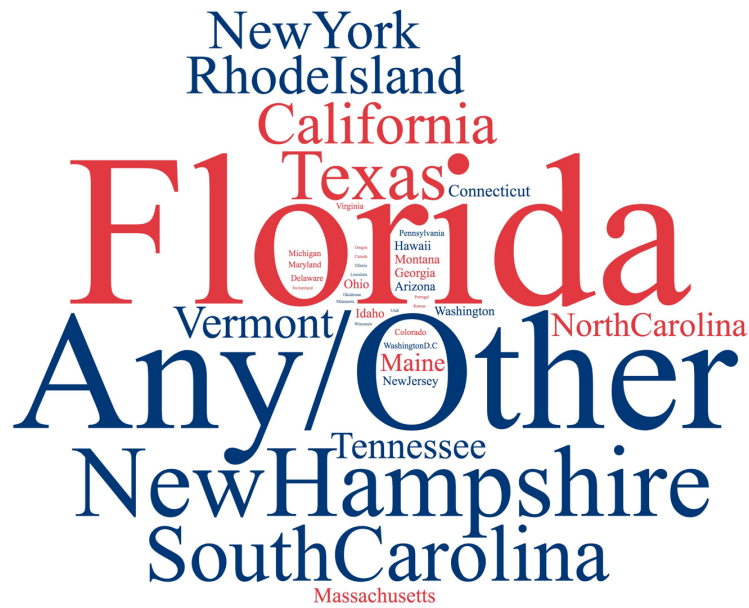

Reason 1: Escaping the High Cost of Living – Examples

“I am a social worker; don't make a lot of money. I need to live in a state that will take less of my paycheck--I need to pay student loans AND save for retirement.”

“Because living in Massachusetts is starting to get costly and expensive because of inflation altogether.”

“Massachusetts is expensive, but not a great place for a young person to live.”

Reason 2: Looking for a Change - Examples

“Graduating from school and considering various job paths. Connecticut is similar to MA, and has a large children’s hospital I am interested in working at.”

“I have mobility issues and could use a warmer climate.”

“I only moved here temporarily to be with family due to health/finances. MA is not ideal for my lifestyle, lacks racial diversity compared to the urban hubs I am used to/is very homogenized and lacks arts/music/nightlife/cultural experiences that other cities have to offer.”

Reason 3: Concerns about High Taxes and Governance – Examples

“Real estate taxes in my town are skyrocketing with less than fair abatements for seniors and property tax in the area of my other home - plus no state income tax - are inviting.”

“High taxes, inflation, corruption at the state level.”

“High taxes, corruption and social dysfunction.”

Reason 4: Feeling Left Out - Examples

“The people are totally ignorant and I get more respect from strangers in my birth state.”

“I do not feel like I belong in Massachusetts. Culturally I do not feel like this is home for me.”

“I was not being treated fairly, While all immigrants were getting everything basically free, right after arriving,while I struggled to get the same things.”

Reason 5: Complaints about Progressive Politics - Examples

“Insane liberal/progressive spending as well as well as DEI programs which are ruining schools and business environments...pitting racial groups against each other.”

“The politics of this state has gotten insufferable. The elitism, the high education nonsense, the spiritual like belief in science and left causes. The people of this state are blinded by their politics and have no idea what is reality going on.”

“Too many taxes and regulations, progressive failures in crime and immigration, COST OF EGGS due to cage free nonsense.”

ⁱ We identified major reasons for considering moving from Massachusetts in the open-ended responses using the structural topic model, a method for identifying thematic patterns in texts. We estimated a model with 5 topics, and used the words most associated with each topic, along with responses highly associated with each topic, to interpret the meaning of the topics. The topics are not mutually exclusive: responses can belong to more than one topic.
