Voters in New Hampshire

335 Likely Democratic Primary Voters (Democrats) 165 Likely Democratic Primary Voters (Independents)

Margin of Error: 5.3% for All Likely Democratic Voters

> 6.4% for Likely Democratic Voters 9.4% for Likely Independent Voters

YouGov interviewed 523 respondents who were then matched down to a sample of 500 to produce the final dataset. The respondents were matched to a sampling frame on gender, age, race, and education based on known characteristics of Democratic Party primary voters from the New Hampshire voter file and the 2018 Cooperative Congressional Election Study.

The matched cases were weighted to the sampling frame using propensity scores. The matched cases and the frame were combined, and a logistic regression was estimated for inclusion in the frame. The propensity score function included age, gender, race/ethnicity, years of education, and region. The propensity scores were grouped into deciles of the estimated propensity score in the frame and post-stratified according to these deciles.

All figures presented in this document are for registered adults who indicated that they are likely to participate in the 2020 New Hampshire Democratic presidential primary.
